FR. JIM'S JOURNAL

*For you, O Lord,
my soul in stillness waits,
truly my hope is in you.*



Today is the first Sunday of Advent, and the first day of our new liturgical year. Advent is a period of great anticipatory joy. Advent has a two-fold character. It is the season to prepare for Christmas when Christ's first coming to us is remembered. It is also a season when that remembrance directs our mind and hearts to await Christ's second coming at the end of time.

We have lost our sense of the value of waiting in our society. We no longer want to wait for anything. Fast food, instant credit, express lanes at the store, no waiting necessary. I have to admit that I do not like to wait, when waiting just becomes a waste of time. But the waiting during advent is not passive or a waste of time. The waiting of advent requires patience. Impatient people are always expecting the real thing to happen somewhere else and therefore want to go elsewhere. The moment is empty. But patient people dare to stay where they are. Patient living means to live actively in the present. Waiting is not passive, but it involves nurturing the moment.

Jesus will come to us in a new way on Christmas if we prepare spiritually. If we are unprepared, we will miss the spiritual gift that God sends us on Christmas. On Christmas morning, millions of material gifts are opened and discarded. Many spiritual gifts from God will be left, unopened. Think of Christmas past, those that stand out in your mind as something special. My guess is that you unwrapped the spiritual gift that year. My guess is that it had nothing to do with material things.

I remember as a child, waiting for Christmas with great anticipation. In those days, we helped Mom bake Christmas cookies, but none of them were eaten before Christmas. We decorated the Christmas tree on Christmas Eve. There were no Christmas parties or gifts unwrapped until Christmas morning. Christmas was so special partially because we had to wait patiently and prepare for it to arrive.

We hope to have at least 2 parish families praying for each candidate. There are 41 candidates preparing for Confirmation. There are still many names left to be picked.



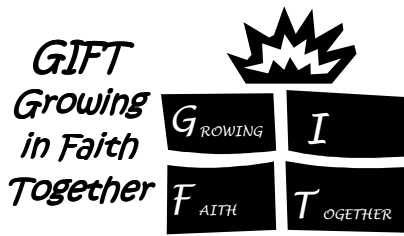
**Good Morning

The Advent Wreath

Today the Church lights the first of the four candles on the Advent Wreath.

It is thought that the origins of the advent wreath lie in the pagan customs of people in the far northern countries of Scandinavia—customs that originated long before the birth of Christ.

Because they couldn't do farm work outdoors in the winter, people brought into their homes the wheels of their wagons, decorated them with greens, put candles on them, and hung them from the ceiling on a wire. Then they would twirl them to become a glowing prayer to the god of light in this time of winter darkness.

Christians later adapted this to celebrate the coming birth of the Light of the World.

Fr. Ray Update

Highlights of my past month include soldiers beginning to make preparations to return home in February and my attending the senior chaplain conference in Bagram and meeting the chaplains and chaplain assistants in attendance. I also count as a highlight my being in Afghanistan to spread goodness and kindness to our soldiers who daily risk their lives. I again thank my bishop, Cardinal Adam Maida from Detroit, and my commander, General James Payne from the 300th Military Police Brigade, for granting permission to be here. Oh yes, the missing 14 rockets fired at FOB Orgun-E last week (I was at Sharona, PRT) is a most notable highlight! Nobody was hurt, thank the Lord. And I've written an article for The Michigan Catholic, the weekly newspaper for the Archdiocese of Detroit. (In last week's edition-November 20th)

The ministry I enjoy among regular U.S. Army Infantry soldiers from our Southern European Task Force (SETAF) and also from the Combat Engineers for rut Texas National Guard is teaching me too much about how to fight a war on terrorism. This is necessary so I know where to safely position myself and, in the event of a mass casualty episode, to be where my help is needed. But I don't have to like knowing these things. Most o four soldiers want peace so they can return to their families and make larger families. Your support for our troops is helping them stay focused. And when they are focused they stay more alert. And when they are more alert they are safer and will be able to return home.

So pray for peace. And act for peace. And prepare to welcome us home when the time comes. Your 18,000 soldiers in Afghanistan are helping to create a better country. Putting politics aside for the moment, you can be extremely proud of each of their efforts.
