FR. JIM'S JOURNAL

Our next G.I.F.T. (Growing in Faith Together) session is coming up very soon. The topic of the next session is the Sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick. This sacrament used to be known as the "Last Rites." It used to be a sacrament that we would administer just a short time before people died. If the priest came in to administer the sacrament, the individual got very nervous because they knew that they were going to die...and very soon. With Vatican II, the theology of the sacrament changed. Unfortunately there is still some of the old mentality surrounding the sacrament that remains.



The sacrament is truly a sacrament of the sick. If someone has a serious illness or is undergoing a surgery, the sacrament of the sick can be celebrated. The sacrament can be celebrated more than once in a person's lifetime. The sacrament can be celebrated more than once in the course of the same illness if the individual's condition worsens. During the sacrament we pray for healing for the individual. Sometimes there is physical healing, and there is almost always spiritual healing. I am certain that we are not celebrating the sacrament as much as we should.

Please attend one of the two sessions either on Friday, October 27th at 6:00 PM or Sunday, October 29th at 12:30 PM. We will be starting with a meal, so plan accordingly. Everyone in the parish is welcome.

During the G.I.F.T. (Growing in Faith Together) session we will be preparing for the weekend of November 4th and 5th, when the sacrament of the anointing of the sick will be celebrated during all of the Masses. Normally, we celebrate the sacrament of the Anointing of the Sick after one of the Masses on the first weekend of the month. This month it will be during all of the Masses. It will be a much more meaningful event for you if you attend one of the G.I.F.T. (Growing in Faith Together) sessions.

If you have a serious illness or are planning to have surgery, please plan on being anointed at one of the Masses on the weekend of November 4th and 5th. If you would like to be anointed, please sit in the reserved seating at the front of church. Representatives from the

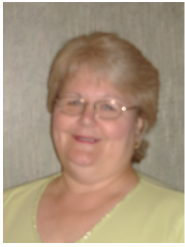

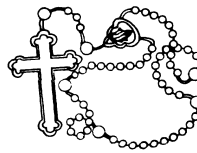
Winter Ministry Schedules

The Sacrament of Anointing of the Sick

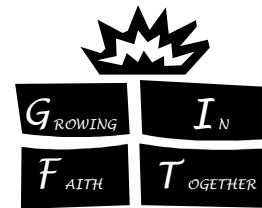

Today is Mission Sunday

We observe the annual day of prayers and sacrifice for the missions today. We unite ourselves with our fellow Christians all over the world who with us attempt to share our faith with others, especially those who have not yet heard the name of Jesus.

During his visit to Germany last month our Holy Father Pope Benedict XVI spoke to young men studying for the priesthood in his hometown. While encouraging them in their vocation he added, "In the so-called Third World—in Latin America, in Africa and in Asia - People are waiting for heralds to bring them the gospel of peace, the good news of God who became man. But there is a lack of people willing to become laborers for God's harvest."

For five hundred years now the modern era of the missionary expansion throughout the world began, with the efforts of St. Francis Xavier, the great Jesuit missionary who at the age of twenty-six left home to bring this unchanging message to the people of Asia, India, Japan and China. Today there are 150 million Catholics living in that part of the world, still waiting for such "heralds of the gospel" to come to them.

This is what World Mission Sunday is all about. We train future missionaries, give them the means to teach, heal and bring the sacrament of the Church to so many hungry people all over the world. This is the great and wonderful gift that only the Catholic Church has to give - the presence of Christ in the Eucharist, to those who are hungering after this bread. We have been given the opportunity to thank God for this gift of Himself to us by sharing it with others.

This is the eighty-first year we have observed World Mission Sunday. There is an envelope included with your box, but if you forgot to bring it, the ushers have additional envelopes. Thank you for your support!

Reflections on the Readings of October 22nd by Deacon Bob

Society puts great emphasis on being the best. Success is mostly measured by who had the most, whether it is power, wealth, or control over others. We preach the “old squeaky wheel philosophy” and think we must fight for our fair share. Taking care of number one is the most important priority in many people's lives.

In today's Gospel, Jesus gives us a scenario that is almost a totally opposite way of thinking. He tells his apostles that true status is not something to be granted to someone, but rather something that stems from one's deeds. He goes on to tell them that to be the greatest you must be a servant to all. In fact, Mark uses the word slave, this makes this very hard to accept. This concept goes against everything that our modern society promotes.

At first glance this seems to be a strange way of thinking until we take a closer look. This kind of selfless behavior is best demonstrated in our homes. As parents we are called to serve our families in just this fashion. We work hard to provide the best home possible for our families. This takes up much of our time and a great deal of selfless effort. The thanks and appreciation for all of our sacrifices, is not something that we often experience. Getting your fair share means getting whatever is left. Our time belongs to everyone else and we get very little time to ourselves. What do we get for all of our work? Well, if your family is anything like mine, we get the greatest that life has to offer. We get people that love us. We get a family that loves each other. We get children that we can be proud of as they carve out their lives in this world. We can see our dreams being realized through our children and their children. If this kind of unconditional love works so well in our homes, then maybe we should try expanding it to our world at large. Jesus is right in teaching us that it is in giving that we receive.

The world tells us that, if we have faith in others, we will be let down or harmed. In our world there are some dangers that we must be aware of, but our Lord expects us to take some risks for the sake of others. As Christians we cannot live our lives in fear. Fear is one of the biggest obstacles to our salvation. Life can be a joyful experience when we can make others happy.

Isaiah, in the first reading predicts the coming of the suffering servant, who will justify many. Jesus is the fulfillment of this prophecy. The life and death of Jesus are perfect examples of how someone can live their life for others. There are many people among us who selflessly work behind the scenes. People who very generously give of their time, talents and treasures where needed. People who just make things happen without much recognition. Today's scriptures are good news for you. They are telling us that you are the greatest.

I wonder if any of us would have done as well.

“One of God's main jobs is making people. He makes them to replace the ones that die, so there will be enough people to take care of things on earth. He doesn't make grown ups, just babies. I think because they are smaller and easier to make. That way he doesn't have to take up his valuable time teaching them to talk and walk. He can just leave that to mothers and fathers.”

“God's second most important job is listening to prayers. An awful lot of this goes on, since some people, like preachers and things, pray at times beside bedtime. God doesn't have time to listen to the radio or TV because of this. Because he hears everything, there must be a terrible lot of noise in his ears, unless he has thought of a way to turn it off.”

“God sees everything and hears everything and is everywhere which keeps him pretty busy. So you shouldn't go wasting his time by going over your mom and dad's head asking for something they said you couldn't have.”

“Jesus is God's son. He used to do all the hard work, like walking on water and performing miracles and trying to teach the people who didn't want to learn about God. They finally got tired of him preaching to them and they crucified him. But he was good and kind, like his father. And he told his father that they didn't know what they were doing and to forgive them and God said OK.”

“His Dad, (God) appreciated everything that he had done and all his hard work on earth so he told him he didn't have to go out on the road anymore. He could stay in heaven. So he did. And now he helps his dad out by listening to prayers and seeing things which are important for God to take care of and which ones he can take care of himself without having to bother God. Like a secretary, only more important.”

“You can pray anytime you want and they are sure to help you because they got it worked out so one of them is on duty all the time.”

Treatment for Influenza

Specific treatment will be determined by your doctor based on:

- Your age, overall health
- Extent of the disease
- Your tolerance to medications
- Your opinion or preference

The goal of treatment for influenza is to help prevent or decrease the severity of symptoms. **There is no cure for influenza.**

- Medications to relieve aches and fevers.**
- Medications used for congestion and nasal discharge.**
- Bed rest.**
- Increased fluids.**
- Medications for cough.**

Antiviral medications-these meds may help to shorten the duration of the illness and to decrease the severity. These meds must be started very shortly after symptoms begin. Notify your doctor as soon as possible.

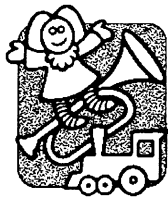
